CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER AND PRESIDENT'S REPORT

What a fantastic year for swimming in Western Australia. In the last 12 months we've secured new events, both national and international, strengthened our partnerships with stakeholders and watched our athletes secure their places on the Australian team headed to London for the 2012 Olympic Games.

Certainly a highlight of the last 12 months was the announcement of the BHP Billiton Aquatic Super Series. A brand new, unique international swimming event, the BHP Billiton Aquatic Super Series will bring together elite swimming, both pool and open water, international waterpolo and community engagement right across the state.

This event will be the biggest swimming event in Australia, and rival the best aquatic events in the world. Taking place in January 2013, with an initial three year run, the vision for the BHP Billiton Aquatic Super Series is that it provide a legacy for the sport in WA for years to come. Swimming WA is a founding partner of this exciting event, and we look forward to its greater impact across the state in years to come.

As an Association, Swimming WA has undergone some significant changes over the last twelve months. Earlier this year our membership passed our new constitution, which marked the beginning of a stronger governance model in line with best practice for sport in WA. We've overseen significant reforms in our competition structure, driven better facility planning, and engaged in school swimming at an unprecedented level. We've also developed a new corporate brand evident across our collateral, and through our media partners, in particular the Sunday Times, we've continued to grow our sports profile around WA.

We also recently said goodbye to our CEO Simon Taylor. Simon has been with Swimming WA for two years, and has helped rejuvenate the Association, as well as the sport in general.

Looking forward, there is a great deal to get excited about. We congratulate Tommaso D'Orsogna, Blair Evans, Sally Foster, Katherine Downie and Jeremy McClure on their selection to compete in London at the Olympics and Paralympics. In September WA hosts the Australian Short Course Championships and January brings the first ever BHP Billiton Aquatic Super Series to Perth.



INFRASTRUCTURE

Align Infrastructure development and access with growth of participation

Brief

Lead and influence the delivery of World Class Infrastructure to attract National and international Events for Western Australia (Open Water and Pool Events).

Outcomes

The securing of the 2012 Australian Open Water Championships held at Champion Lakes in early 2012 was a tribute to Western Australia and its ability to deliver national level events in world-class facilities. With more secured national and international events on the horizon, VenuesWest committed to over \$500,000 to invest in vital asset replacement and upgrades such as new blocks, a state of the art video board, structural renovations to the Omega room and timing equipment. These items are pivotal to the procurement of national events and are a crucial investment for the sport in Western Australia .

Swimming WA secured New South Wales Institute of Sport swimmer Matthew Abood, Olympian and WA export Eamon Sullivan, former world record holder Riosuke Irie and a small contingent from the Japanese national team to WA for the WA State Swimming Championships in January 2012. This was aided by the profile of the BHP Billiton Aquatic Super Series and infrastructure improvements to Challenge Stadium.

Working closely with VenuesWest, Department of Sport and Recreation and Swimming WA Patron Norman Moore, all involved await approval from the Minister for Sport and Recreation for funding to conduct the Business Case for the redevelopment of Challenge Stadium that includes an option to enclose the outdoor 10-lane 50m pool.

Swimming WA continue to sit on the Steering Committee and Project working Group for the BHP Billiton Aquatic Super Series and have negotiated a jointly funded position that will allow Swimming WA to leverage off the event in regional and remote communities.

Brief

Ensure the SWA Office is representative of the profile of Swimming and can deliver on the sports direction adequately.

Outcomes

In 2011/12 Swimming WA enhanced the capability of staff through the procurement of new technology. Staff commenced training on the new hardware and software packages. The new technology is providing greater functionality and streamlined efficiency for staff.

Swimming WA continues to work closely with Beatty Park Leisure Centre and the Town of Vincent to investigate options for expansion to ground floor when space becomes available as part of the redevelopment. Further office expansion will provide staff with the workspace required to be more efficient and effective in day-to-day operations and also make provision for the potential housing of the other aquatic sports in the future.

Brief

Lead and influence appropriate access to water space across grassroots through to high performance.

Outcomes

Access to water space is an ongoing issue and as these agreements come up for renewal it is a continual battle to ensure swimming clubs gain the access they require to service their club members. The Strategic Aquatic Facilities Steering Group will work to more globally to educate and work with facility owners and managers on the benefits that a swim club can bring to the community. Swimming WA continued to work with clubs as requested on the negotiation of partnership and user agreements with aquatic facility owners and managers.

Swimming WA worked closely with the City of Fremantle in the early discussions for the Fremantle ocean side pool. This work and close relationship aimed to ensure the pool is suitable for competitive swimming, and potentially host a Swimming WA swim meet upon completion. An ocean side pool in Fremantle will not only benefit swimming as a sport, but also the local community by offering an alternative to traditional aquatic facilities. Swimming WA will continue to work with the City of Fremantle towards the delivery of an ocean side pool.

INFRASTRUCTURE

Brief

Establish partnerships with facilities for various levels of access for training and competition from community to performance.

Outcomes

The strong relationship with VenuesWest continued throughout 2011/12. The two organisations worked on the development of the next 3-year agreement for the use of Challenge Stadium water space for events and the capital procurement to support swimming.

Swimming WA continued to engage with aquatic facility owners and managers on facility upgrades and redevelopments to ensure they benefit swimming clubs and the sport of swimming. This included Mandurah, Cockburn and Broome.

Swimming WA developed a collaborative relationship with South Fremantle Senior High School to deliver learn to swim activities for the South Fremantle community. This program was rolled out in term1 2012 and was well received. This program will be built up on in 2012/13.

This year the Bay View Saints Swimming Club was created, based out of St Hilda's Anglican School for Girls' pool. School pools provide some of the best access to water space for our swimming clubs due to the reduced community use. Swimming WA continued to work with both public and private schools to provide further access to water space for new and existing clubs, and also assisted schools through the school swimming pathway.

Swimming WA continued to build on the relationship with LIWA. Swimming WA presented at the LIWA Conference to pool managers on the benefits of clubs in local pools and the important role they play for aquatic centres. This strong relationship should see further opportunities such as this in the future, and continue to ensure swimming clubs are given the best opportunity to access water space in the future.

Brief

Drive the implementation of Strategic Facility Plan for Aquatic Sports.

Outcomes

Swimming WA also is a part of the Aquatic Facility Steering Group, which consists of other water sports (water polo, masters swimming and diving), LIWA, local governments and DSR. The aim of this group is to provide feedback to local councils who are considering upgrades and redevelopments, and try to ensure all sports are being catered for, or at least considered.

Swimming WA continued to work with the other aquatic sports on the development of the Aquatic Sports Strategic Facilities Plan in WA to establish regional, state and world-class facilities. As well as developing the Strategic Facilities Plan the aquatic sports formed the Strategic Aquatic Facilities Steering Group. This group is now engaging local government authorities and other aquatic facility stakeholders such as LIWA to open communication between aquatic sports and local councils on accessing water space. This group now aims to make more local councils and government authorities aware of what they can offer in order to secure appropriate water space for the future for aquatic sports.

Ensure Communication channels are utilised to the highest standards.

Outcomes

Over the past 12 months Swimming WA has identified the need to engage in new technologies to increase the profile of the sport, both in the public domain and throughout the membership.

Social media management has enabled Swimming WA to converse with its members and the potential target market to create brand awareness outside of the WA swimming community. Swimming WA's growing presence on facebook has allowed the organisation to become the authority on all things competitive swimming in Western Australia.

Swimming WA have utilised the two eNewsletters to foster long-term relationships with its members. The grassroots nature of the eNewsletter has encouraged community involvement in the editorial process, and in turn increasing readership of the eNewsletter.

Brief

Develop strategic media partnerships to enhance the profile of swimming across print, radio, television and online in Western Australia.

Outcomes

Swimming WA has actively pursued new and strengthened existing media partnerships over the past months, resulting in a significant increase in exposure across WA's media. Through the existing partnership with LMSC, Swimming WA created new opportunities to promote individual athletes across 6PR radio, and has secured future opportunities for Swimming WA events to receive broadcast coverage on Foxtel – Aurora.

Swimming WA's existing partnership with The Sunday Times has continued to expand the reach of the sport through one of the largest newspapers in the State. As well as providing significant advertising opportunities, The Sunday Times has also promoted a range of Swimming WA competitions and programs such as Dive and Try and the Open Water Series across editorial including STM, ChillOut!, body+soul sections.

Brief

Maximising Swimming WA's exposure and its member's successes through the media.

Outcomes

Regular media exposure legitimizes Swimming WA's place within the sporting field of Western Australia. Consistent media coverage enhances the Association's reputation among existing and prospective members, and attracts stakeholder attention. Over the past 12 months Swimming WA has been regularly capitalising on media opportunities presented by a host of key events Australia wide. By utilising media as a promotional tool, Swimming WA aims to increase the frequency of the sport's exposure in the public domain. The Association has also focussed on encouraging clubs to manage local media proactively with common goal of gaining maximum recognition for its members. Swimming WA has secured a balanced mix of state and local media outlet coverage throughout 2011/12.

Develop and adopt a Swimming WA master brand strategy to strengthen the positioning of the Association in line with its current, vision, purpose and goals.

Outcomes

A consistent and identifiable brand is critical to the success of Swimming WA's expansion and continues to be a priority within the communications department.

In order to better strengthen the Association's position in line with its vision, purpose and goals, Swimming WA has continued to apply the master brand across all areas of business. Collateral for campaigns including Indian Ocean All Stars Challenge, SunSmart Dive and Try Meets and the Corporate Lunch Series project a high level uniformity and professionalism that is constantly being pursued by Swimming WA. Consistency amongst all external branding has ensured that the Association is recognisable to both the swimming and corporate community.

Enhance national and international profile.

Outcomes

2012 Australian Open Water Championships

Swimming WA runs a vibrant and highly successful Open Water Series each year, and the staging of the 2012 Australian Open Water Championships at Champion Lakes Regatta, Armadale, complimented the ongoing success and development of the sport in WA.

A record number of 419 competitors lined up against not only Australia's best athletes but also some of the world's best with this year's Championship event boasting an impressive field of international competitors from Canada, Ireland, Japan, New Zealand, Malaysia and USA. Among the big names were Australian Olympian Melissa Gorman, Canada's Richard Weinberger fresh off podium finishes in Brazil and Argentina, as well as Kenichi Doki from Japan and Chris Bryan from Ireland who placed in the top 5 at the World Championships in 2011.

The success of the 2012 Australian Open Water Championship has established Western Australia as a prime candidate for future events of this scale and has also placed the state on the map of many international athletes.

BHP Billiton Aquatic Super Series

As a founding partner of the BHP Billiton Aquatic Super Series, Swimming WA has been involved in the event since its inception and has played a significant role in the delivery of each element of the event, from pool and open water to the regional engagement program. Profile athletes such as Geoff Hugill and Matt Abood have frequently announced their involvement and support for the event, securing significant national media coverage.

This event will have an enormous social and economic impact within our sport as well as positioning Swimming WA as a true leader in the aquatics industry. Aligning the Swimming WA brand with an event of this magnitude has increased the profile of Swimming WA both nationally and internationally, with the event attracting key athletes from neighbouring countries.

2012 EnergyAustralia Short Course Championships

The meet will showcase the return of the Australian Olympic Swimming Team in their first competition appearance since the London Games. Swimming WA will utilise the added media attention that these athletes will attract to raise the Association's national profile.

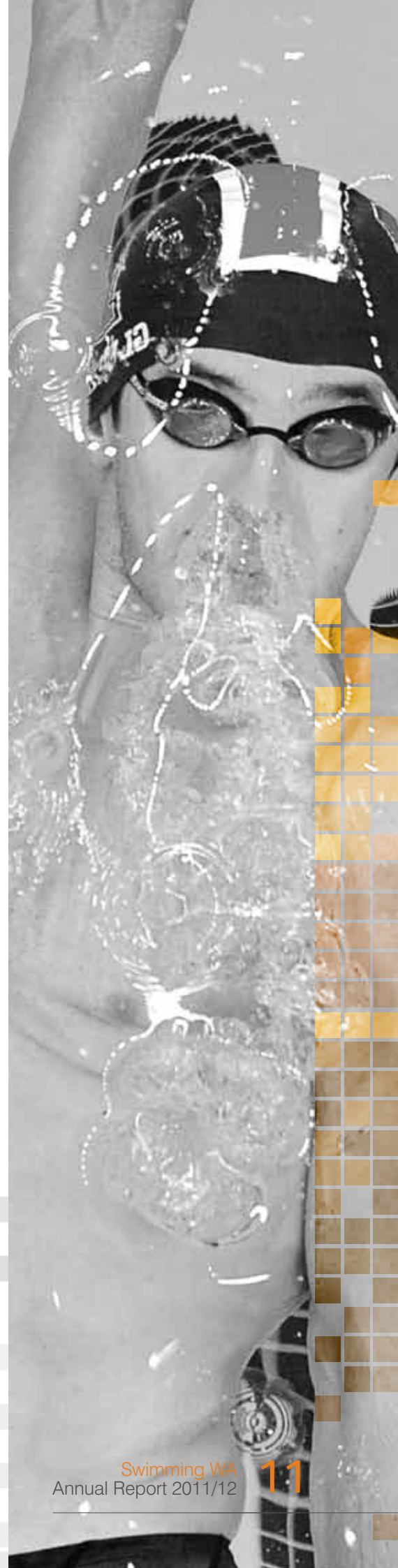
Build relationships with the WA Corporate Community, Swimming Alumni, Commonwealth Games and Olympic Swimmers and SWA membership.

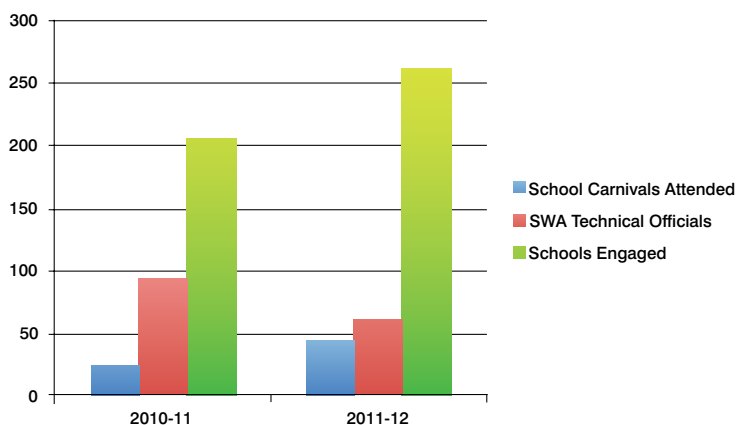

Outcomes

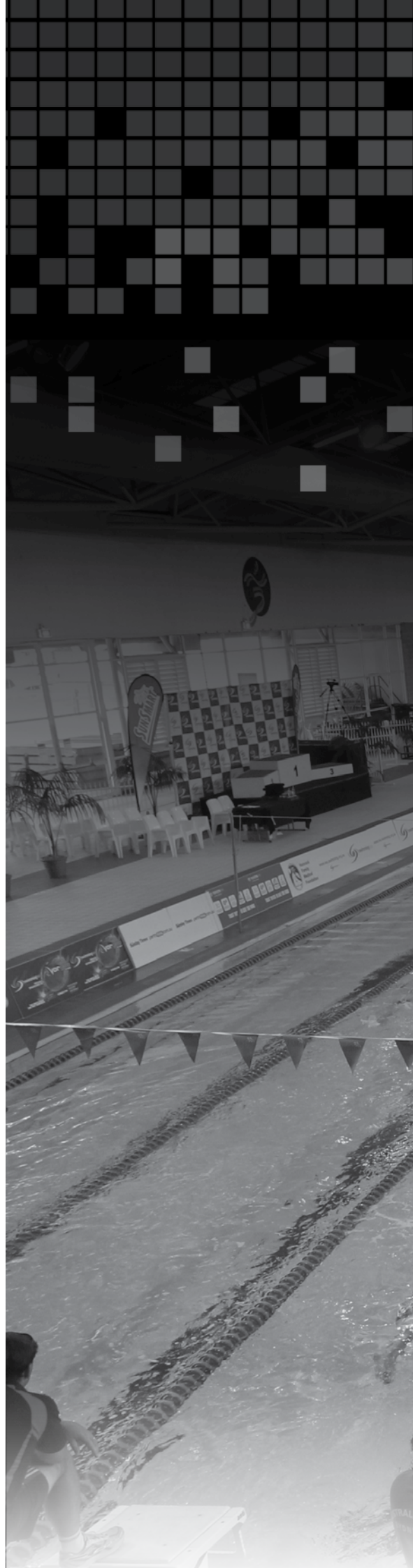
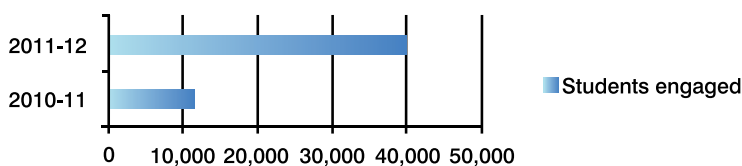
School Swimming Pathway

Swimming WA has developed a School Swimming Pathway that demonstrates the desired progression of young swimmers from a school swimming program level, through to National School Sport Swimming Championship level. Swimming WA utilised this Pathway as a valuable tool to target, encourage and guide young budding swimmers through to the highest level of the Pathway.

During 2011/12 Swimming WA identified the need for a Schools and Performance Coordinator to focus on successfully engaging schools throughout Western Australia and introducing the School Swimming Pathway. Through the assistance of the newly appointed Schools and Performance Coordinator, Swimming WA attended 47 school swimming carnivals, gaining exposure to over 250 schools and interacting with approximately 39,825 students.

Brief

Engage Department of Education, Schools and the University Sector to build participation in the sport of swimming.

Outcomes

SunSmart Schools and Colleges Relays

The 2012 SunSmart Schools and Colleges Relays event reaffirmed its popularity within the school community hosting 37 schools, 759 relay team entries and approximately 3,000 students on the day.

Christ Church Grammar School retained the coveted Pop Agnew Trophy (Boys 6x50m Freestyle Relay) and clinched the Champion Boys School Cup for the third successive year. St Hilda's Anglican School for Girls claimed the esteemed Lynne Watson/Lyn McClements trophy (Girls 6x50m Freestyle Relay) and were also crowned the Champion Girls School Cup winners for 2012.

Due to the overwhelming demand for the metropolitan event, Swimming WA introduced the inaugural SunSmart South West Schools and Colleges Relays, held at the South West Sports Centre in Bunbury in 2012. Swimming WA has been engaging with relevant stakeholders to develop a SunSmart Schools and Colleges Relays event in the Mid-West and Great Southern region to come to fruition in 2013.

Swimming WA Schools Associations Meet

In 2011/2012 Swimming WA hosted the inaugural Schools Associations Meet, a competition developed as part the School Swimming Pathway and opportunity for students to compete above an interschool competition level. Prior to the meet, Swimming WA engaged School Sport WA, IGSSA, PSA and ACC to support and further promote the Schools Association Meet to the higher achievers at each of the schools events.

140 students from 64 secondary schools throughout Perth competed in the maiden meet. The winner of each event on the night received an automatic offer to be a part of the WA State Schoolboys and Schoolgirls Team with the remaining places to be made up of paper nominations.

Brief

Develop new and build on existing partnerships.

Outcomes

School Sport WA

School Sport WA had not formed a State Schoolboys and Schoolgirls Swimming Team since the School Sport Australia National Championships held in Perth in 2009. In 2011/12, it was made a Swimming WA priority that Western Australia would be well represented at the 2012 national event.

Swimming WA's Schools Associations Meet provided the missing link between interschool level and national level competition on the School Swimming pathway, and also doubled as the School Sport WA's selection event for the State School Team.

Swimming WA's assistance in forming WA State Schoolboys and Schoolgirls Team has lead to a vital partnership between Swimming WA and School Sport WA. This newly formed partnership will allow Swimming WA to deliver targeted information regarding school swimming events and programs directly through the sports coordinators of Western Australian schools, thus extending Swimming WA's promotional reach.

Triathlon WA

Swimming WA has been working with Triathlon WA to develop collaborative programs beneficial to both Associations. Swimming WA will build on this rapport as well as initiate relationships with other external sporting organisations.

Brief

Establish programs that encourage participation of officials at all levels of the pathway.

Outcomes

Functions

Swimming WA recognised our Official's vital contribution and dedication to sport with functions including two Coaches and Officials barbeques, as well as an Officials Thank You evening over the 2011/12 season.

Officiating Working Group

In 2011/12 Swimming WA identified the need for an increase in qualified Officials throughout Western Australia. As a result, the Officiating Working Group was formed consisting of Steven Rose (Swimming WA), Kaye Bolger (Technical Official) and Dorothy Harris (SWA Board Member). Through the Officiating Working Group avidly undertaking research and assisting the Technical Education Committee, Swimming WA will endeavor to increase the number of Officials and the status level of Officials within WA.

Brief

Promote participation in swimming across all market areas ensuring inclusion of Multi Class athletes, indigenous, CaLD, both regional and rural and internationally.

Outcomes

Swimming WA has been actively promoting Swimming Australia's inclusion programs to clubs with the aim of increasing participation in the Multi Class sector. Swimming Australia's Inclusive Club Program is similar to that of the GO Club PB Program, in which clubs are ranked by their ability to satisfy key areas. WA's Superfins Swim Club has been the most successful so far, receiving a five-star status for inclusion.

Swimming WA's Multi Class athletes proved very successful in 2011/12, with a strong contingent of swimmers representing Western Australia at Australian Championship events.

Swimming WA continues to work closely with the APC and Swimming Australia on the training of new classifiers and improving Multi Class Swimming in Western Australia.

Enhance the sustainability of Swimming WA and its clubs

Brief

Assist Clubs through Education, Training and Support.

Outcomes

Swimming Australia's GO Club PB program is the national swimming club standard that recognises and rewards swimming clubs by measuring their performances across five areas: Membership, Administration, Activities, Coaching and Officiating, Marketing and Promotion.

For the 2012 GO Club PB program, 40 WA clubs completed the required workbook and received a standard.

The GO Club PB program has proved a valuable tool for Swimming WA as the framework identifies clubs' areas of weakness. To assist clubs on improving upon these areas, Swimming WA held ten GO Club forums during 2011/2012, focusing these forums on troublesome areas.

Outcomes

Swimming Australia recruitment and retention strategies include the JX and YPS programs.

Ready Set Race

Ready Set Race is currently in a trial phase and works on engaging Learn to Swim participants through the opportunity to compete in a fun, safe and inclusive environment. Ready Set Race aims to bridge the gap between Learn to Swim and Swimming Clubs by engaging young swimmers who may not have otherwise continued participating in organised swimming activities once they graduate from their swimming lessons.

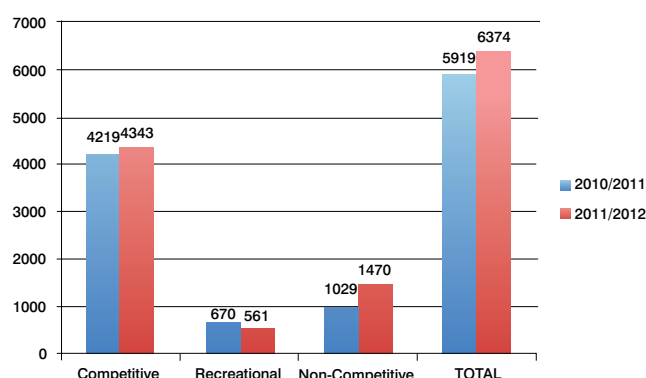
Swimming WA has worked closely with Swimming Australia on the framework for the delivery of this new initiative, and will launch the program in 2012/13.

The SunSmart Dive and Try swim meets have been proudly held in Western Australia for the past 41 years. The SunSmart Dive and Try series is Swimming WA's premier Junior Sporting Program and aims to encourage participation in the sport through friendly, non-threatening swim meets with modified rules.

The 2011-2012 SunSmart Dive and Try season hosted the most successful series yet with a record 29 meets held in aquatic centres around metropolitan and regional Western Australia. An astounding 985 participants did as the series name suggests, diving in and trying competitive swimming, many for the first time.

Swimming WA is proud to provide Western Australia's youth with the unique opportunity to be involved in one of Australia's leading sports. The growth of the SunSmart Dive and Try Series will continue to ensure the emergence of young talent from a wide demographic and guarantee a promising future for the sport of swimming in Western Australia.

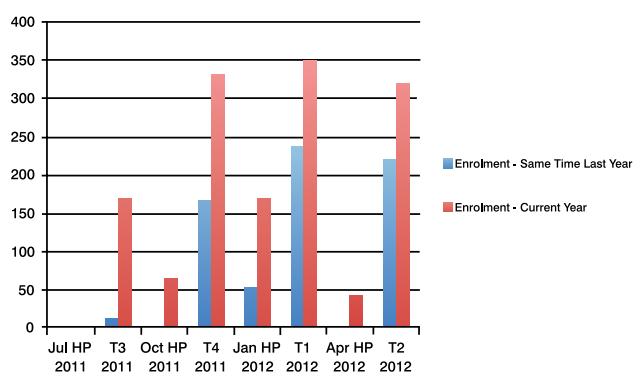
Brief

The Chisholm College Learn to Swim Program has experienced remarkable growth during 2011/12. Due to popular demand, Swimming WA introduced two additional holiday programs in 2011/12 and will return as a regular fixture on the 2012/13 Learn to Swim Calendar.

Swimming WA identified an expansion opportunity in Perth's southern metropolitan area and in January 2012 introduced the Learn to Swim Program to South Fremantle High School.

Brief

Advance and ensure the sustainability of SWA events and activities.

Outcomes

After each SWA event a post event debrief is completed with SWA staff and stakeholders to ensure the sustainability of the event/activity.

After exploring the options and finding the event does need to take place we then ensure we consider some of the following qualities:

- an accessible and inclusive setting for all
- a safe and secure atmosphere
- minimal negative impacts on the environment
- encourages healthy living
- promotes responsible sources
- leaves a positive legacy
- delivers excellent customer experience

When organising SWA events/activities we ensure the process starts long before the event takes place and continues after the conclusion. The SWA events department also ensure an action plan is created with clear measurable objectives and sufficient resources are allocated to ensure the long term financial savings for each event.

A greater SWA staff presence at our pool events has also been incorporated to greater assist with our officials for a smoother event to take place. SWA believes that by working together we are providing a greater service to our Member/Swimmers and Officials.

Another way we are improving our events is the continual streamlining of online entry processing as well as event promotion. We want ensure we are continuing to find ways to improve our service to our members and actively seeking new members as well.

Brief

Optimise access to Government grants and sponsorship revenue.

Outcomes

Due to the extensive activation at each OWS location and the potential to engage the wider community at each venue, individual councils were prospectised as potential event partners.

Deliver competition events and corporate events to the highest standards

Brief

Leadership in competition planning and the delivery of Swimming Events.

Outcomes

Pool Swimming

During 2011/12 Swimming WA has seen many changes to competition planning and delivery.

Changes include

- The 2011 Hancock Family Medical Foundation Short Course Championships was a combination of Open, Age and Junior events, eliminating the need for separate competitions. This format was repeated at the 2012 State Long Course Championships.
- Relay events were eradicated from State Championship meets, instead a Club Relay Day competition was introduced and held off the back of the Championship meet.
- A collection point was established at the medal presentation area for unclaimed medals and alleviated the need to delay presentations until all medal winners arrived.
- Swimming WA introduced two new meets during 2011/2012, the Swimming WA Metropolitan Championships and the End of Summer Sensation. Both meets were well received and will be a welcomed inclusion to the 2012/13 calendar.

Open Water Swim Series

2011/12 hosted the biggest Swimming WA Open Water Swim Series to date with the season extended to encapsulate eight iconic Perth locations, spanning from Rockingham to Mullaloo. Swimming WA added shorter distances to the program to encourage younger, novice open water swimmers to participate in the 250m or 750m distances. The series appealed to swimmers of all ages, from eight years old to eighty, with 954 different individuals taking part over the course of the season.

Another successful innovation in 2011/12 was the progressive series points score system that allowed swimmers to compete on a level field regardless of age or distance completed. This was achieved by ranking various race attributes on a degree of difficulty scale, encouraging swimmers to participate in more rounds to accrue the maximum number of points.

Brief

Establishment of clear policies and procedure documents around all SWA Activities.

Outcomes

In 2011/12 Swimming WA has taken the proactive step to produce accurate documentation at the conclusion of every event. These documents include checklists and policies to assist with the running of high quality events, as well as detailed instruction on how to improve said events in the future.

To improve resource efficiency, each Swimming WA run event is now classified into a Tier 1, Tier 2 or Tier 3 event. The tiered system represents a different level of financial, human and operational resourcing allocated to conduct events in each tier. Specific documentation outlining the policies and course of action for each tier is readily available at staff disposal.

All of these documents and policies are reviewed at regular intervals to ensure their relevance.

Brief

Benchmark event delivery and execution against best practise in events and sport.

Outcomes

Swimming WA strives to achieve excellence in the delivery of events whether it is a pool, open water or corporate event. In 2011/12 Swimming WA conducted significant research into improving the execution of its events, for example amalgamating the State Open, Age and Junior Short Course Championship competitions into one meet. This strategy has aligned with best practice as other state bodies including Swimming QLD, Swimming NSW and Swimming VIC have adopted this approach to Championship events.

EVENTS

The Competition Planning Committee review the competition calendar and endeavour to develop it further using feedback from Swimming WA participants and other stakeholders. Post event debriefs are conducted with venues and suppliers to help work through any issues that may have arose and brainstorm ways to improve event delivery in the future.

Swimming WA continues to look towards the national body, Swimming Australia, for benchmarks in excellence and strives to deliver a top quality event at every event that we deliver.

Enhance the participation and atmosphere at all SWA events.

During this year's Awards breakfast Swimming WA announced the renaming of the main award, previously known as the Swimmer of the Year Award. The newly titled Lyn McClements Swimmer of the Year Award recognises McClements' contribution to the state and country, and was this year awarded to Blair Evans.

To enrich the annual event Swimming WA evoked the services of MC Lachy Reid, produced signage to decorate the room and enlisted sponsors to provide giveaways and prizes for the guests. Corporate Events

The Swimming WA Corporate Lunch Series was first introduced in 2011/12 and focussed on engaging our corporate contacts in the sport of swimming. The inaugural Swimming WA Corporate Lunch was held on the 22nd June with Michael Mischin as the key-note speaker. Since then, Swimming WA has enlisted the services of Grant Stoelwinder, high profile swimmers and Government officials as key-note speakers for subsequent lunches. The lunch series was a great success with a strong level of engagement from prospective stakeholders. The lunches are a great indicator of the continued strength of SWA's corporate relationships.

In addition to the Corporate Lunch Series, Swimming WA hosted a State Championships Pool Side function during the State Open and Age Championships in January 2012. This event invited Swimming WA's existing sponsors and partners, along with a number of potential new sponsors, to witness the pinnacle event of the year. Key guests such as WAIS Performance Manager Greg Hodge, Swimmers Blair Evans and Travis Nederpelt and former swimmer Deane Pieters proved integral in displaying the professionalism and passion involved in the sport to our VIP events, and made a successful event. A similar event was held on the following night for Life members and past Olympians etc. Swimming WA will look to host another function in conjunction with the 2012 EnergyAustralia Short Course Championships in September.

PERFORMANCE

Deliver sustained high performance by Western Australian swimmers, coaches and officials

Brief

Increase Western Australian representation (Swimmers/Coaches/Officials) on National Teams/squads at ALL levels.

Outcomes

National Teams and Squads

In 2011/12 Western Australian swimmers secured 15 positions on various national teams including the FINA World Cup team, Commonwealth Youth Games team, Paralympic Pan Pac's team and World Open Water Swimming Championships team. Joining our athletes on these teams were three coaches and six officials from Western Australia. Western Australian representation was also seen on both the 2011/12 Australian Squad and Australian Youth Squad featuring nine and seven swimmers respectively. WA had 45 officials represent across the six National events held during the 2011/12 season. With more national and international events being held in WA during 2012/13 season Swimming WA is working towards an increase in national representation across athletes, coaches and officials.

Travel Assistance Grants

Travel Assistance Grants (TAG) are provided to WA athletes based on the principle that competitive athletes travelling interstate from Western Australia incur disproportionate travel and accommodation costs compared to interstate athletes when competing interstate. It is recognised that an assisted relief in offsetting some of these costs is in the best interest of swimming in Western Australia for the pursuit of national representation. 45 athletes received TAG funding for National Competitions during 2011/12.

The Australian Junior Excellence Program (JX) and The Australian Youth Performance Squad (YPS)

The Australian Junior Excellence Program (JX) program recognizes, rewards and encourages junior swimmers who, through their development of aquatic skills and fitness, achieve a high standard of swimming excellence.

Under the program, swimmers aged from 9 to 13 years, who accomplish times set by Swimming Australia, qualify at Gold, Silver, Bronze or Green standard, depending on their best performance/s during the season.

In 2011/12 Swimming WA had 1260 swimmers achieve a JX standard with each swimmer receiving a pack for their efforts. There has been a constant increase in swimmers being recognised in this program from Western Australia each year. The most notable increase is in the number of swimmers who have achieved a Gold or Gold Star ranking in comparison to the previous year.

PERFORMANCE

The Australian Youth Performance Squad (YPS) is designed to reward swimmers aged 13-18 for their performances in the pool. The YPS is an extension of the JX program and rewards swimmers for achieving particular time standards set by Swimming Australia.

The YPS targets athletes at the crucial age of 13-18, where adolescent's attitude towards sport and physical activity can be ambivalent. It is an extremely encouraging sign to experience an increase in YPS athletes as the figures demonstrate the impact of the program on this age group. Through more promotion of this program at club level, the sport of swimming should see a continual growth in this difficult age group and ensure athletes commit to the sport for a greater period of time.

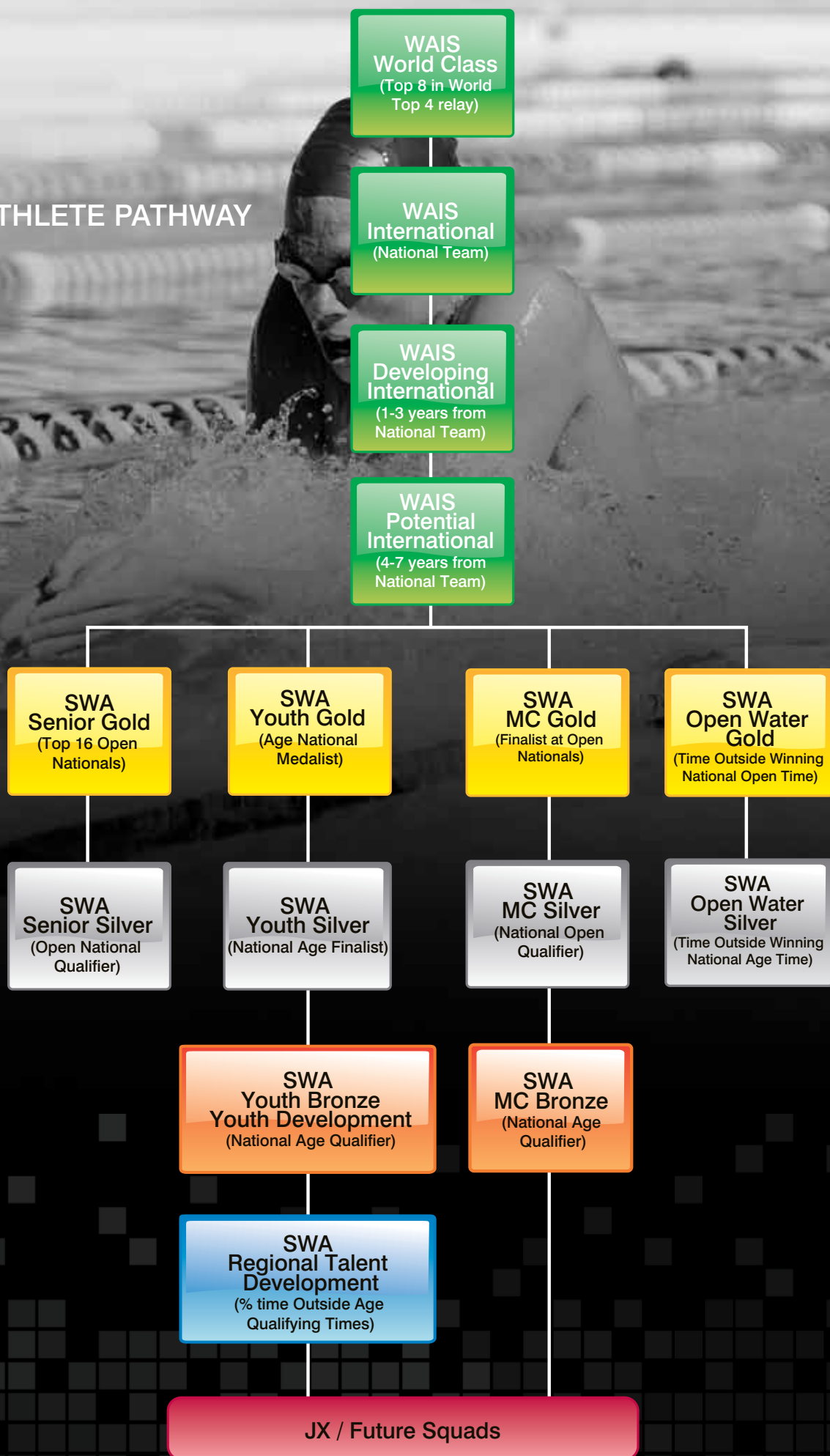
2011-12 Performance and Development Squad Program

- Performance standards required of the Platinum Coach will include; medal-winning performances at World Championships and/or Olympic Games.

Outcomes

A coach accreditation pathway and promotion collateral has been developed.

Brief

Build the relationship between WAIS/Regional Academies/Swimming Australia and SWA and its Clubs.

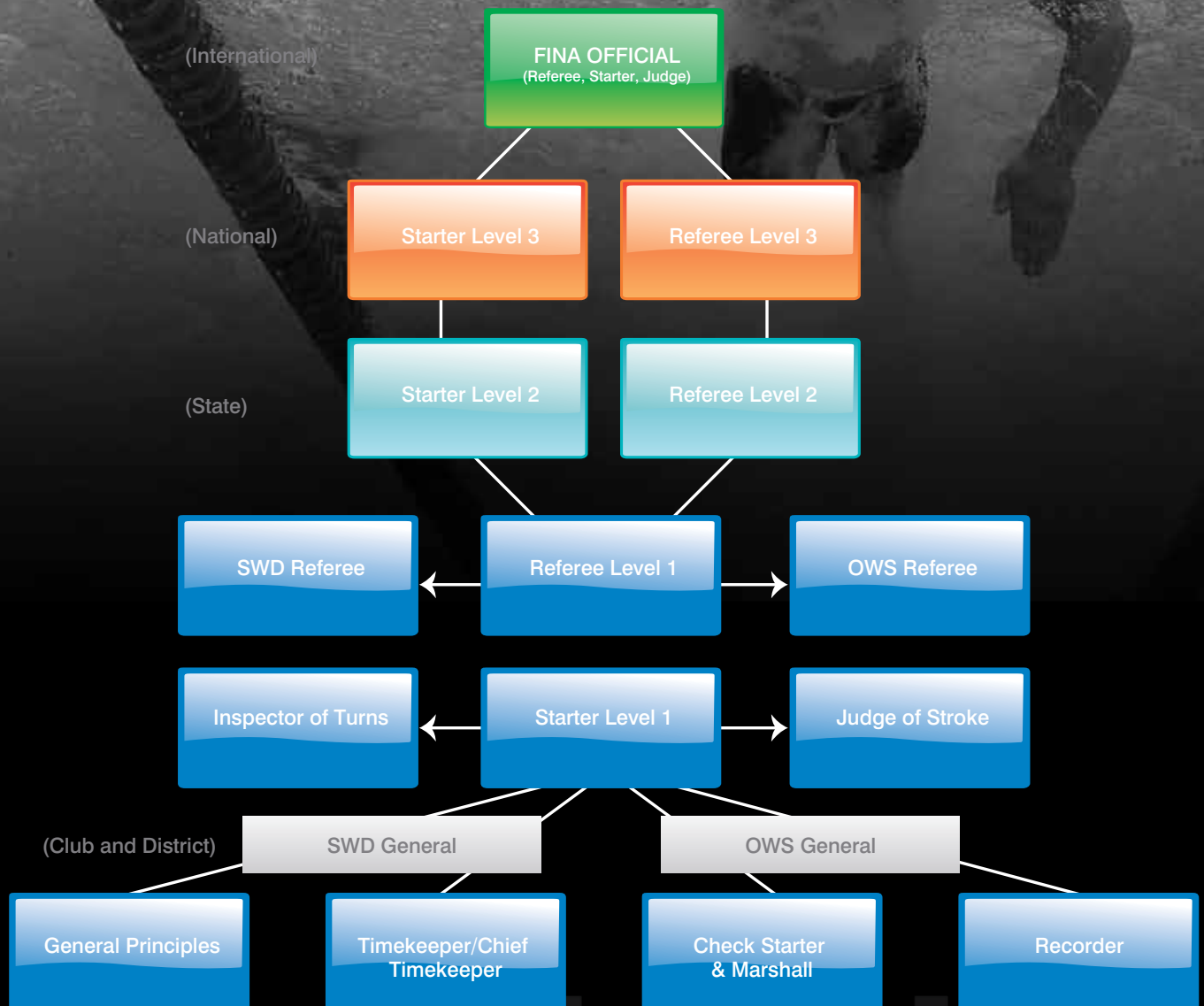
Outcomes

Swimming WA, Swimming Australia and WAIS make up the Joint Management Committee (JMC) that oversees the development of high performance outcomes in WA. This group meets twice per year to review and refine the mechanisms that ensure WA stays at the top of the podium.

Swimming WA and WAIS are continually refining the opportunities available for WA swimmers to achieve their potential. Throughout 2011/12 discussions continued around the development of a new high performance centre model that would see more dedicated high performance programs developed across WA.

Swimming WA has further developed its relationship with clubs with greater club resources being developed and made available to Swimming WA member clubs. Swimming WA has also increased its staffing delivery capacity in the development department to better service clubs and swimmers. Swimming WA continues to work hard with its regions to refine communication pathways and support mechanisms, particularly for the regional and remote regions and clubs.

OFFICIATING PATHWAY





PERFORMANCE

Brief

Develop an Officiating pathway to recruit and retain officials and ensure officials are provided with the opportunity to be educated to the highest standard.

Outcomes

Swimming WA has developed an Officiating Pathway to clearly illustrate the steps to be followed in order to progress to the highest level of officiating.

This pathway is also a vital tool used to determine the structure of Swimming WA's Officiating Courses. Swimming WA is looking to develop an Officiating Course calendar to raise awareness of course offerings and availability.

Frequency of courses and catering to specific levels/qualifications is essential in the recruitment and retention of Officials in Western Australia.



GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Brief

Establish Governance best practise for Swimming WA and its members.

Outcomes

Swimming WA contracted an external consultant to assist the Board and management to re-develop the Association's Constitution. The document was entirely re-written incorporating some of the most modern and progressive governance principles within the not-for-profit sector. This new Constitution will ensure the Association remains at the forefront of best practice governance for years to come.

Brief

Embrace technology to innovate and maximise delivery in events, administration and communication.

Outcomes

With the significant assistance of a Department of Sport and Recreation Sport 4 All ClubTalk grant, Swimming WA was able to implement their ICT upgrade plan and replace the Swimming WA Information Technology infrastructure including staff computers (desktop and laptop), servers and telephony. This upgrade has significantly improved the Associations efficiency and capacity to deliver better opportunities for its members.

Brief

Ensure Swimming WA is recognised and respected as a leader in the Aquatic industry in Western Australia and throughout Australia.

"To be the Premier Aquatic Sporting Body in Western Australia"

Outcomes

With this vision as our goal, Swimming WA has begun to develop stronger partnerships with WA's aquatic sports. In 2011/12, Swimming WA continues to develop its formal partnership with Synchro WA that sees resources shared between the two organisations, as well as greater collaboration in the areas of development, infrastructure, profile and advocacy.

Swimming WA continues to improve relationships with Masters Swimming Western Australia, WA Water Polo Association and WA Diving Association. All aquatic sports, in conjunction with the Department of Sport and Recreation, worked to develop the 'Aquatic Sports Strategic Facilities Plan'. This publication outlines the water space, dimensions and other requirements of facilities for each of the aquatic disciplines. Once the publication was completed a steering committee was established to ensure the resource was promoted to local government as the benchmark when looking to re-develop or build a new aquatic facility within WA. Several facility development committees have already utilised the document and the steering committee for advice on facility development. This is a positive step forward to ensure that swimming clubs and events are being considered within the planning phases of new or re-developed facilities of the future.

GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Brief

Ensure SWA is resourced appropriately to meet its objectives.

Outcomes

As the swimming environment continues to change in WA, Swimming WA strives to ensure that its resources are one step ahead. Significant staffing resources have been added to the Association over the 2011/12 to ensure that the Association remains relevant and supportive to its membership.

Swimming WA pool and Open Water events continue to grow and hence has the resourcing provided to these vital programs.

Swimming WA has employed new staff in its development team to further enhance the link between the educational sector and our sport, with great success in the development of a school swimming pathway.

Brief

Build the capability and capacity to ensure delivery of services

Outcomes

To ensure Swimming WA continued to deliver on its ambitious Strategic Plan, a professional development plan was put in place to build staff capability in line with the procurement of new technology. This training and support ensured that resource efficiency was maximised across all service delivery areas.

Capacity improvement is continually being addressed through the renewal of ageing infrastructure, research into best practice, review and refinement of existing programs, continual engagement with members and other stakeholders. This forward thinking and future planning ensures that Swimming WA remains one of the leading innovative Swimming Associations in the country.

Brief

Establish clear policy for the administration of the sport.

Outcomes

With the development of the new Constitution in 2011/12 it was also identified that all of the Swimming WA policies and procedures would require review and updating. This process included involvement from Board, Committees and staff and will take some time to ensure all documentation is aligned.

Once completed Swimming WA will have a very clear set of governance principles and underpinning policies and procedures that lead the administration of the sport in WA.

Brief

Build an achievement culture within the organisation.

Outcomes

With the developments in governance, technology, programs and services and re-branding, the culture within the Association and its members continues to evolve. Staff are delivering to a higher level on a day to day basis and the assumed quality of program and service delivery has increased over 2011/12.

As a Region we would like to acknowledge this dedication from our Coaches and wish them success with their swimmers in the future years. I would like to acknowledge the appointment of James Hornby to the ASCTA WA Board which has given our South West Coaches a voice on ACSTA. Also to acknowledge and congratulate Andy Hedges on his award at the Swim West Coaches Conference.

With an emphasis on Swimmer Development through camps and clinics has lead to the great achievement of the Region in having, in 2012, six swimmers attend the Olympic Trials 2012 – EnergyAustralia Open Championships in Adelaide and ten swimmers attend the Australian Age Championships in Brisbane. Well done to the swimmers and their coaches in achieving this high standard of swimming.

The Department of Sport and Recreation has continued to assist the Region through Development Plan funding and has been an avenue for information which assists the Region to grow.

South West Development Squad for the 2011/2012 year - as per the past year we followed our Policy and then moved for the inclusion of nominated swimmers from the smaller Clubs that did not qualify. This saw a selection of 51 athletes, 11 coaches, 5 mentor swimmers and 3 team managers.

Region One Carnival – Bunbury Aquatic Centre 2011

South West Region One Swimming Carnival was held on 27th November at the Bunbury Aquatic Centre. What a great meet. A record entry of 257 competitors which enforced the need to use the 10 lanes at Bunbury. Many PB's were swum and many records broken.

As a Region we were very thankful to have some great Sponsors to assist with the financial running of our meet.

During the carnival we were able to present our 2011/2012 Development Squad with their new Shirts and take a photo of the Squad and support team.

Country Pennants 2012 - Collie

A great Country Pennants was put on by a very hard working group of volunteers from the Collie and Harvey Swimming Clubs. Rod, Peter, and Bryan along with their Clubs managed to put together a great venue and a very successful meet. All 12 of our Clubs were in attendance and we managed to have a few of our Clubs win Awards and many of our young swimmers went home for the first time with a medal.

Country Pennants within our Region was a time of Club growth and team building. We can only hope this continues throughout the next season.

The Bunbury Club was successful in winning the A Grade Relay Trophy – a good hard effort by all the Bunbury swimmers.

Along with the success of our Clubs at Country Pennants, I would like to highlight the success of two swimmers from the Bunbury Club – both Adele Schultz and Lyndon Goldworthy won the "Senior closest to State Record in both the 50m and 100m".

Great Southern Region - Kaye Bolger

Swimmer and Coach development continued through the year with several Clinics held throughout the Region by Clubs. Two Region clinics were held – a 3 day Clinic in Narrogin with Terry Lalor as Head coach and a 2 day Clinic in Albany with Kareena Preston as Head coach.

Officiating Courses were also conducted and well attended during the Albany Clinic.

A Region team again competed in the Club Premierships in Perth narrowly missing taking out C Division by just 4 points, a great effort from a young team of swimmers.

This type of event is a great experience for the regional swimmers to compete in a high class competition and atmosphere presented by Swimming WA at the Challenge Stadium. REGIONAL COORDINATOR'S REPORT

Goldfields Region - Lynda Duncan

December 4 & 5th 2011 Kambalda hosted another Terry Lalor Clinic, inviting Esperance & Kalgoorlie swimmers to attend. Although it was not a Region initiative the Clinic works as a good PR event for all. 30 swimmers from the club attended.

The Future Squad session was arranged with Megan Kremer (Kalg) & Tanya Kemp (Kambalda) coaching, 18th March Clinic was originally organized to be held at the Norseman outdoor 50m 6 lane Pool (1/2 way travel mark between Esperance & Kalgoorlie) with 16 swimmers invited. The weather turned bad on us and on Saturday all was changed and swimmers held their session at the Oasis in Kalgoorlie on the Sunday, sadly with Esperance not attending but having their own Future Squad session in their home pool.

Swimmers enjoyed the sessions and gained valuable knowledge and development skills. Peaked caps were awarded throughout the 2 sessions.

The second session was held the following weekend at the end of Kalgoorlie's Terry Lalor Clinics. Again Megan & Tanya assisted with Terry.

The Region meeting held discussions about confirming Esperance hosting a Short Course Inaugural meet (trial run) in June, along with invitation to Terry to host a Clinic on the Saturday and also have some Technical Courses. The outcome of this event would have been to see an annual SC event in the winter alternatively held in Esperance or Kalgoorlie. Unfortunately this event had to be cancelled but will continue to work on achieving a better outcome in Season 2012-13.

Discussions have been held with DSR Kalgoorlie for future funding.

We look forward to progressing the Region and working on what needs to be done to create initiatives and incentives for parents to become more involved in committee.

Midwest Region - Nick Short

One of the most peculiar aspects of Regional WA is larger than usual geography with smaller than usual populations. For the area covered by the Midwest Region it is disappointing that we only have 3 registered clubs and hope remains that we will get that 4th up and running in the next year or two.

Our 3 clubs at present represent Geraldton, Wongan Hills and Dalwallinu. All 3 clubs competed in the Country Championships in January with 38 swimmers between them, 7 Geraldton swimmers then went onto the State Open and Age championships.

10 athletes combined again represented all 3 clubs at the Junior State titles in March.

In between championships, at the Country Pennants in Collie, Wongan came 3rd in C grade with Geraldton securing 5th in B grade. Both results encouraging with current team sizes. Unfortunately Dalwallinu lack numbers at this time however have an eye to the future.

Wongan Hills club are looking forward to hosting Country Pennants in 2013.

On a Regional front we held our 2nd annual Regional Championships. For the first time in Dalwallinu in their new pool. A great meet with some very sound performances. Wongan narrowly secured the "Alf Matthews Shield" from Geraldton. Geraldton look forward to hosting the other 2 teams in February 2013 and are currently investigating option to have a "camp" including a clinic on the Saturday and a meet on the Sunday.

The Geraldton Short Course Classic was held in April with around 100 competitors representing 18 clubs. A fantastic meet once again that gave regional swimmers a chance to obtain Short Course times for state titles.

Two of the clubs in the Region shut down over winter. Geraldton continues and 8 swimmers competed at the Short Course state titles.

Pilbara Region - Erin Shaylor

It has been great to access Terry Lalor's coaching and professional development Clinics and the results have spoken for themselves in the PB's and increased fitness early in our season.

Terry's delivery was, as the club's required, and he covered all ranges of coaching experience and swimmers abilities. He was able to advise clubs on their season set up and programming. It has been great having Terry, and Steven, visit the Regional events to follow up and support our clubs with issues and club development.

The Region looks forward for the continued support from the Swimming WA Development team.

Karratha Club took a team of 28 swimmers to compete in A grade in the Country Pennants at Collie. Official's training was accessed by some parents of the club who were able to pass on some of that training to Wickham recording team.

A successful North West Open took place in March in Karratha with SWA Technical Officials attending the meet. These officials were able to train up parents from our region and sign off on a number of skills.

The Regional funding will continue to ensure that these training opportunities are available at both the North West Open and the Pilbara Champs.

REGIONAL COORDINATOR'S REPORT

First meetings have taken place for the BASS activations scheduled for September and then in November. All seems to be on track for attendance of elite swimmers at our Pilbara Championships.

Swimming WA, through Steven Rose, have been supporting Newman club as it prepares for the Hancock memorial Swimming Champs on 23rd/24th/25th November. Changes to the programme which were proposed at the last meet in Exmouth at our AGM in November 2011, have been discussed with Meg, Steven, Lisa Parks at Newman and myself. Wickham gave some feedback on the changes.

Steven has been in regular contact with me regarding any issues and questions about events. I really appreciate his support and he has raised the profile of SWA in the country to be very positive and accessible to our regional swimmers and clubs.

Kimberley Region - Sandra Jeffery

The Clubs

There are currently two affiliated swimming clubs in the Region (Broome Barracudas and Derby Sharks), with a third (Kununurra Crocs) investigating the prospect of re-affiliation after recent growth and increased participation rates at the club following several years of decline. Broome has 61 swimmers placed into 6 squads with a core group of 19 competitive swimmers training year round. Derby has 40 swimmers who are predominantly recreational although with the club continuing to rebuild there is a small group of 10 competitive swimmers who travelled to several competitions during the year.

Broome Barracudas held their AGM in November 2011 where several new committee members took on positions of President, Vice President, Secretary and Head Coach. Derby Sharks held their AGM in August 2011 and operated during the past season with a small but positive committee focussed on rebuilding the club, finding their feet and returning to being competitive.

The Club and Regional Events

Both Broome and Derby clubs held Time Trials regularly throughout terms 4 and 1 with Broome Barracudas awarding swimmers with PB Certificates when they recorded a new personal best time. This proved to be a very successful strategy to encourage younger swimmers to participate in Club Time Trials and Derby is keen to implement the strategy in the coming season. Derby also held Club Mornings on a Saturday morning to get the whole club together and join in fun activities including relays and water aerobics followed by a relaxed and healthy fruit morning tea.

The Kimberley Open Championships is the Region's Annual Short Course Competition and the 2011 event was extremely successful with a record 20 SWA clubs, 1 Victorian club and 3 Northern Territory clubs with a total of 141 competitors travelling to Broome for the 2 day competition on 8th and 9th October 2011.

The Swimmers

Broome Barracudas had a total of 21 swimmers who were recognised as part of the JX Program including 3 gold, 7 silver, 2 bronze and 9 green standard swimmers. Derby Sharks had 4 swimmers named in the JX program including 1 silver, 1 bronze and 2 green standard swimmers.

Broome also had three senior high performance swimmers recognised in the YPS program including 1 silver, 1 bronze and 1 blue standard swimmer. These senior swimmers were also selected for places in the SWA Silver Youth Squad (1 swimmer) and the SWA Regional Development Squad (2 swimmers) and the athletes are excited about the opportunities and further development they will be able to participate in as a result of their selection in these squads.

During the past season a total of 469 state records were broken during the 2011 / 2012 season compared to the 503 for the 2010 / 2011 season.

The top 5 male record breakers were Tommy Sucipto SLD (55), Damian Fyfe CPER (22), Jack Wilson ARE (12) Austin McAleese ROC (11) and Ethan McAleese ROC, Robert Evans PAQ (both with 6 each). There were a total of 15 local male record breakers.

The **most improved Male Long Course record** broken was the All Comer Club and Residential Club Maida Vale's team of Scott Evans, Simon Kok, Eric Dennis and Matthew O'Connor in the 10yrs 200m Medley Relay which was reduced from a time of 2:36.18 to Arena's team of Kieran Coyne, Max Bremer, Brodie Loller and Jack Wilson's with a time of 2:29.20 a 4.68% improvement.

The **Oldest Male Short Course record** broken was Ben Lindsay of Arena's time in the 18yrs 50m Breaststroke on 4th June 2012 which broke the record previously held by Ryan Price of Aqua Attack set on the 20th June 1999, a record that had stood for 12yrs and 350 days.

The **most improved Male Short Course record** broken was the WA All Time and Residential 14yrs 100m Butterfly which was reduced from Garth Kate's time of 0:58.55 to Damian Fyfe's new time of 0:56.38 a 3.85% improvement.

The **Oldest Female Long Course record** broken was Kara Broadbridge of Fremantle Port in the 9yrs 50m Backstroke on 3rd March 2012 which broke the record previously held by Richelle Jose of City of Perth set on 19th January 1989, a record which had stood for 23yrs and 43days.

The most improved Female Short Course record broken was the WA Residential 12yrs 200m Butterfly which was reduced from Brianna Throssell's time of 2:28.94 to Tamsin Cook's time of 2:20.22 a 6.22% improvement.

Country Statistics

During the past season a total of 470 country records were broken during the 2011 / 2012 season compared to the 426 for the 2010 / 2011 season.

The top 5 record breaking clubs were Peel Aquatic (216), Bunbury (188), Albany (38), Waroona (8) followed by Busselton and Mandurah (with 6 each). There were a total of 9 clubs whose members broke records.

The top 5 female record breakers were Adele Schultz BUN (13), Natasha Antonio BUS (6), Carly Hall WRO (4), Shantel Miskin-Ripa BRM, Gabriel Cannon ALB and Summer Burkett MDR (all with 2 each). There were a total of 6 country members that broke country records.

The top 5 male record breakers were Lyndon Goldsmith BUN (113), Robert Evans PAQ (61), Brodie Hedges PAQ (49), Jordon Kendall BUN (25) and Ryan Evernden BUN (20) There were a total of 15 country members that broke country records.

The Oldest Male Long Course record broken was Cooper Kennedy of Esperance in the 8yrs 100m Freestyle on 14th January 2012 which broke the record previously held by Roy Warren of Newman set on 4th January 1984, a record that stood for 28yrs and 10 days.

The most improved Male Long Course record broken was the Country All Time and Residential 17,18yrs and Open 400m Medley Relay which was reduced from Bunbury's team of Lyndon Goldsmith, Ryan Evernden, Jordan Kendall and Alexander Griffiths time of 4:20.34 to Peel Aquatic's team of Joe Stimson, Robert Evans, Brodie Hedges and Josh McClelland time of 4:04.81 an 6.34% improvement.

The Oldest Male Short Course record broken was Seth Spencer of Peel Aquatic in the 10yrs 50m Freestyle set on 3rd June 2012 which broke the record previously held by David Higgins of Mandurah's on 24th July 1994, a record that had stood for 17yrs and 315 days.

The most improved Male Short Course record broken was the Country All Time and Residential 18yrs 200m Medley Relay which was reduced from the team of Mandurah's time of 1:59.58 to the team of Peel Aquatic's new time of 1:49.23 an 9.48% improvement.

The Oldest Female Long Course record broken was Adele Schultz of Bunbury in the Womens Open 50m Backstroke set on 14th January 2012 which broke the record previously held by Louise Scharf of Mandurah's set on 21st January 2000, a record which had stood for 11yrs and 358 days.

The most improved Female Long Course record broken was the Country All Time and Residential 10yrs 100m Backstroke which was reduced from Brooke Wilson's time of 1:19.34 to Shantel Miskin-Ripia's time of 1:18.96 an 0.48% improvement.

The Oldest Female Short Course record broken was Carly Hall of Waroona in the 14, 15yrs 1500m Freestyle set on 15th July 2011 which broke the record previously held by Josephina Parfitt of Golden West Dolphins on 16th August 2002, a record which had stood for 8yrs and 333 days.

The most improved Female Short Course record broken was the Country All Time & Residential 8yrs 100m Breaststroke which was reduced from Katelyn Crock's time of 1:57.32 to Natasha Antonio's new time of 1:54.70 an 2.28% improvement.
